- 9 A. Zimmerman.
- 10 | Q. What do you call her?
- 11 ILISSA ZIMMERMAN, ESQUIRE: Ilissa. She doesn't call me
- 12 | anything.
- 13 Q. Okay. Well, if I say Ilissa, that's who I'm talking
- 14 about, okay?
- 15 A. Okay.
- 16 Q. Okay. One of the things we kind of talked about was

- 1 Ο. So what are you telling me? Mom doesn't buy you 2 anything? 3 NEGATIVE 4 0. No? 5 She doesn't buy me anything. Α. 6 0. She doesn't buy you anything? 7 A. No. 8 Q. Steph? 9 She doesn't. Α. Are you sure about that? 10 Q. 11 AFFIRMATIVE 12 Q. Are you really sure about that? 13 AFFIRMATIVE 14 She doesn't buy you new shoes when you want new shoes Q. 15 or you need new shoes? 16 NEGATIVE 17 Q. Steph? 18 She doesn't. Α. 19 How about telling me about what you and Dad do. I'm Q. 20 not talking about the other kids or Uncle Dave or
- 22 A. We do all kinds of stuff.

anybody else. Just you and Dad.

23 Q. Like what?

- 24 A. Like eat pizza.
- 25 | Q. You eat pizza?

- 1 A. That's what I like and hamburgers. That's what I
- could live on--hamburgers and pizza.
- 3 | Q. Do you two ever go for walks?
- 4 A. No.
- 5 | Q. Are you sure when you were still living there?
- 6 A. No.
- 7 | Q. Did you go to Grandma and Grandpa's?
- 8 A. My Grandma is blind.
- 9 Q. I know your Grandma is blind.
- 10 A. And Pap has a big scar down here.
- 11 Q. Yeah, I know.
- 12 A. He had surgery.
- 13 Q. And what that has to do with going for the walks with
- Dad...I'm talking about when you were living at the
- trailer right there by Grandma and Grandpa, okay.
- 16 A. Where there's a no trespassing sign?
- 17 Q. Yeah.
- 18 A. Okay.
- 19 Q. Okay. Did you and Dad go for walks there often?
- 20 A. Right down at the road.
- 21 | Q. What else do you do? Did he ever play games with you?

- 10 Q. The Dollar Tree. Okay. I'm kind of old, Steph. I

- 12 A. Do you got a hearing aide?
